Apostles: The Sons of Thunder

So much could be said about James and John individually. James was the first apostle to be martyred, dying by Herod's sword in the early days of the New Testament church. John was the "disciple whom Jesus loved," probably the only one to die of old age, and the writer of five books of the Bible.

It would, however, be hard to separate these two men who had so much in common. They were both sons of Zebedee and Salome. They were both fishermen. Along with Peter, they were both part of Jesus' innermost circle. In addition, they apparently both shared a prominent character trait that led Jesus to call them the Sons of Thunder.

A few incidents from Scripture help us understand why our Lord would give them such a fierce nickname. On one occasion, when some Samaritans told Jesus to stay away from their village, James and John asked if they could call down fire from heaven on the Samaritans. Perhaps it was the same zeal for Jesus' honor that led John to report how he and James had told a man who was not one of the Twelve to stop doing miracles in Jesus' name. Later we see their ambition focused a bit more inwardly as the two men let their mother request for them the top spots in Jesus' kingdom. On each of these occasions, our Lord

had to correct them. Call it what you will: zeal, enthusiasm, passion; these men were fired up about Jesus and their work! Unfortunately, that desire was at times misguided or misplaced.

How quickly our own eagerness to be faithful to God can cause us to resent those around us who are not so eager! How easily our drive for doing God's work can become a selfish ambition, a seeking of glory for ourselves instead of our Savior!

Thankfully, the intensity of James and John was eclipsed by that of Jesus. Jesus' passion was evident as he resolutely set out for Jerusalem, as he sweat bloodlike drops in Gethsemane, as he bit his tongue at his "trials," and as he clenched his teeth at his crucifixion. He was so eager to save you and me that he was willing to let the Father's fire rain down on him and his thunder roll over him in our place, for our sins.

It's hard not to get fired up about serving a Savior like that, so there's nothing wrong with making a little noise for him! Be filled with zeal for Jesus and his work—and let that passion always be focused on him and guided by his Word.



Seek the LORD while he may be found; call on him while he is near. (Isaiah 55:6)

Are you having a tough time? Do you feel like a prisoner to this world? to your boss? to your money? Are there other things that make you feel imprisoned? I just finished reading a book, To End All Wars, I received as a gift. It is written by a man who survived the prison camps along the river Kwai during WWII. Many of those prisoners began to lose their faith; in fact, they started to question the very existence of God. Have you ever felt like that? What did you do?

The prisoners started acting just like their captors. They were stealing from each other, hitting each other, yelling at one another, even tattling on each other. It was definitely a time of looking out for number one because no one else will. When they got to the point of not caring whether they or anyone else lived or died, they started to **seek the LORD.** You often hear of people in these situations start bargaining with God..... "If you get me out of this, I will follow you". God is not in the business of making deals. They searched scripture to find Jesus. This is how the book told it:

Through our readings and discussions we gradually came to know Jesus. He was one of us. He would understand our problems, because they were the kind of problems he had faced himself. Like us, he often had no place to lay his head, no food for his belly, no friends in high places. He, too, had known bone-weariness from too much toil; the suffering, the rejection, the disappointments that make up the fabric of life.......

As we read and talked, he became flesh and blood. Here was a working-man, yet one who was perfectly free.....They had sought to destroy him but they had not succeeded.

True, he had been suspended on a cross and tormented with the hell of pain; but he had not been broken....He had remained free and alive, as the Resurrection affirmed. What he was, what he did, what he said, all made sense to us. We understood that the love expressed so supremely in Jesus was God's love – the same love that we were experiencing for ourselves – the love that is passionate kindness, other-centered rather than self-centered, greater than all the laws of men.

They found Jesus and they found peace. They continued to get beaten by the Japanese guards. They continued to get sick. Some still died. The difference was the love of God and the peace that having that brings and they found the truth of 1 John 3:23 **And this is his command: to believe in the name of his Son,**Jesus Christ, and to love one another as he commanded us. They showed true love for one another. They weren't doing things to get something in return. Not even a thank you was required; they just did it out of pure love or as they said passionate kindness. Don't let the troubles of this world get you down

Seek the LORD while he may be found; call on him while he is near. If you continue trying to work things out on your own, you will find trouble The LORD is with you when you are with him. If you seek him, he will be found by you, but if you forsake him, he will forsake you. (2 Chronicles 15:2)

Please join us in seeking Jesus. We find Him in our Worship Service, Bible Study, and we get a real good look at His Love in our Lenten Services. What a blessing to be able to have two Worship Services each week starting Wednesday, February 18 where we can get a good look at Jesus' love through the passion history. Find Jesus and find the freedom from sin, death, hell and Satan. Find Jesus and find freedom from an "unfair" boss. Find Jesus and find freedom from the chains of financial trouble. Find Jesus and find freedom to love your enemy, whoever or whatever that may be. You may still have a mean boss. You may still find it hard to make ends meet. You will still have people who dislike you. But, you will have the love of the Lord **And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.** (Romans 8:28)

As World War 2 came to an end, these former POWs began caring for the wounded Japanese soldiers, following Jesus' words in Matthew 5:43-45 "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven.

Father in Heaven, we come looking for you. We continue our search through Your Word. Be with those who are leading our search. Give them strength to continue in their leadership and help us as we seek with them, with others, and on our own through Your Word and Sacrament. Amen

Your Input Is Needed






What you need:

Lakeside Lutheran High School Principal's Annual Report to the Federation (2014)

Guidance call. In fall 2013, Dr. Dennis Gulczynski announced his retirement effective at the close of the 2013-2014 school year. "Dr. G" served Lakeside since 1973.

Lakeside placed several calls to qualified candidates in the field for this position. Mr. Andy Rosenau accepted the call on April 13. Before coming to Lakeside, Mr. Rosenau served at St. Matthew's Lutheran School, Oconomowoc.



Athletic Director. Mr. Gerald Hahn announced his retirement from the teaching ministry at the close of the current school year. By then, he will have been at Lakeside 20 years. He currently serves as Athletic Director and boys physical education teacher.

As part of Lakeside's new strategic plan, the scope of this call is broadened to *Activities* Director, a position that oversees all co-curricular offerings.

On November 25, the Holy Spirit led Lakeside's General Board to extend a call to Mr. Steven Hennig as the Activities Director. After due deliberation, he returned the call on December 27. God willing, the General Board will issue its next call on January 27.

Strategic Planning. Over the past year-and-a-half, Lakeside developed a strategic plan with a new mission statement, and three-, five-, and ten-year goals. Numerous meetings and informational sessions were conducted throughout the Federation to gather input from <u>all</u> stakeholder groups. Highlights of this process included listening sessions in many Federation congregations in fall 2013 and an open forum on October 22, 2014.

The General Board had its first reading of this strategic plan on November 25.

Excellence in Speech Award. Lakeside's Forensics Team received its <u>fifth</u> consecutive *Excellence in Speech Award* from the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association at the state tournament on April 11, 2014.

At that tournament, the team achieved its highest score since Coach Steve Lauber took over the program six years ago. Among all competing schools in the state, Lakeside placed first! All 25 team members earned medals: 16 gold and 9 silver.

The Lakeside Forensic Team also captured the 12-team Capitol Conference Championship on February 3, 2014.

FFA. In fall, Lakeside became the first "private" high school in Wisconsin to be granted a charter for a Future Farmers of America (FFA) chapter. In order for a school to charter and maintain an FFA chapter, there must be a certified licensed agricultural educator who also serves as the chapter adviser. That individual is Mr. Jeff Meske, Lakeside's Tech Ed teacher. In 2015-2016, Lakeside will offer a new course in its curriculum, *Agriculture Survey*. This will serve as an orientation course for Lakeside students to learn how the agriculture industry is organized, what its major components are, and how agriculture exerts a significant influence on the state's economy.

Jordan Gaal, one of the valedictorians, was cited a Kohl Excellence Scholar in a ceremony in Janesville on April 5. This is second consecutive year that a Lakeside senior received this honor. Elizabeth Schwartz, another valedictorian, was named a finalist in the prestigious National Merit Scholarship Competition.

98 students were awarded diplomas on May 25, 2014.

National Merit Scholar Semi-Finalist. One of Lakeside's current seniors, Kiana Krszjzaniek (Holy Cross, Madison), is a semi-finalist in the National Merit Scholarship Competition.

Lakeside students who wrote the ACT in 2013-2014 did well, scoring well above both the national and state averages. Furthermore, those scores were consistent with our five-year average scores. Compared to Lakeside results from the previous school year, scores in three core areas – English, reading, and science – rose. English showed the greatest increase. Furthermore, Lakeside students who wrote the ACT in 2013-2014 also scored above the state and national averages in "college readiness" for college level English Composition, Algebra, Social Science, and Biology. The percent of Lakeside students meeting the benchmark scores for all four college level subject areas was 51%. The state average was 34%.

Call received. Pastor Don Schultz, Lakeside's Assistant Principal for Student Life, received a divine call to be the President of Manitowoc Lutheran High School on January 10, 2015. Pastor Schultz has served at Lakeside since 2005.


