Make this special plate as a gift to give this Christmas.

What you need:

- Clear glass plate
- Acrylic craft paint
- Paintbrush and water
- Black permanent marker

What you do:

- 1. Turn plate upside-down on table. Paint one of your palms brown, and press it on the center of the plate.
- 2. Rotate the plate so fingers point down. Using yellow paint, make a straw bed in the palm.
- 3. Mix white and brown paint for Jesus' face. Use white paint for a swaddled body.
- 4. Paint a yellow star above Jesus and a yellow border around the plate rim.
- 5. When paint is dry, turn plate over. With the marker, draw dots for Jesus' eyes and write the words of Luke 2:12 around the plate rim.

Flags in the Worship Space

Old Glory and God's Glory

At its regular meeting on November 12, 2014, the Church Council discussed the issue of whether or not to place our national flag in the new church. Here are some of the key issues they have been studying:

Key Issues

- A key question is this: Is Christianity an American religion? Obviously, the answer is no. Christianity is a-political. It is both cross-cultural and counter-cultural. Our Savior made clear that his "kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36). Jesus came to die for all people regardless of race, country or political ideology. The Christian Church is made up of people from "every nation, tribe, people and language" (Revelation 7:9). The American flag represents the ideals of one nation at one point in the world's history. Care should be taken that the American flag not be seen as a Christian symbol.
- Though we are proud to be Americans and grateful for the freedoms God provides us as citizens of this great country, the purpose of worship must be clear. We don't come to God's house to honor our great nation. We don't come to thank brave veterans, grateful as we are for their service. We come to God's house to give thanks to him alone for the blessings of his grace, especially the blessing of full and free forgiveness in Christ. Certainly, among the blessings for which we give thanks to God are the freedoms we enjoy as American citizens and the brave men and women who have defended those freedoms. However, we must always remember that, "every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows" (James 1:17). We thank God for those who have defended our freedoms. We pray for the leaders in our government and the members of our armed forces. We do it all remembering that, for every freedom we enjoy, spiritual and political, the glory belongs to God alone.
- Symbolism in worship is important. Our chancel has been carefully planned and designed. The
 purpose of every piece of furniture and art in the sanctuary is to direct our attention to God's
 grace in Christ. The American flag is ill-suited for this purpose. For this reason placement of the
 flag was not part of the planning process for our new church. A couple of helpful quotes:
 - Some churches like to include the national, Christian, and denominational flags in the chancel. While many Lutheran congregations have displayed flags of one sort or another, building committees ought to carefully analyze this tradition. Altar, pulpit, and font "all point to Christ," while national flags "speak not of Christ, but of the nation." Especially in an age when so many Christian churches confuse the separate roles of church and state, it may be wise to place national flags in the narthex rather than in the chancel. (Christian Worship: Manual, NPH 1993, p. 85. Quotes are from Bruggink, Christ and Architecture.)
 - Many Lutheran churches display flags in the chancel or nave, but this practice must be discouraged. The national flag is a symbol of the state whose values and purposes are different from, and sometimes incompatible with, those of the church. If congregations insist on having the flag, it should be displayed in the narthex or fellowship hall. (The Altar Guild Manual, Lee Maxwell, CPH 1996, pp. 45-46)

- Display of the American flag in church does not have a long history. Rev. Bryan Gerlach, chairman of the WELS Commission on Worship, notes: "The display of the national flag is a short-lived tradition. Lutherans never did this prior to World War I and then only in America. German Lutheran churches seem to have begun displaying the flag during and after World War I and World War II to make clear that they were loyal to the United States. The perceived need was perhaps stronger when worship was conducted in German."
- Displaying the American flag in the worship space can easily confuse the doctrine of the two kingdoms. To the state God has given the sword (force of law) for the purpose of keeping order. To the church God has given the gospel (the means of grace) for the purpose of making disciples. Rev. Gerlach states: "Separation of church and state emphasizes the political notion that the state should not seek to influence the church and that the church should not rely on the state to carry out spiritual goals. The doctrine of the two kingdoms emphasizes the biblical teaching that God operates through both the state and the church. Luther called the state 'the kingdom of God's left hand' and the church 'the kingdom of God's right hand.' These two are to be kept separate not only for political reasons but also for spiritual reasons ... The doctrine of the two kingdoms is there for our good. It neither diminishes patriotism in the kingdom of the left hand nor 'Americanizes' the nature of the church in the kingdom of the right."
- A WELS pastor comments: "A flag is a symbol that represents a certain segment of a divided human race. It does not represent God, God's Word, God's sacraments, or any divine truth. And we ought not foster a notion that our nation much as we love it is God's favorite."

Conclusion

Rev. Gerlach states: "It is best not to display national flags in the chancel or in other places within the worship space ... It is probably best to reconsider placement of flags during a new church construction project, renovation or remodeling." It is this last bit of advice that has brought this issue before us at this time.

For all of the reasons stated above, the Elders Board, Church Council and pastors agree that it is best not to display the American flag in the worship space. However, they feel that including our flag in some way on our property is desirable. For this reason, they are suggesting two options:

- 1. Place the flag in our fellowship hall, or
- 2. Add lighting to the large flag that flies on our property so that it can be on display at all times.

The members of the Church Council take this matter very seriously and would appreciate hearing from you. What are your thoughts? Which option do you prefer? Please let them know. Thank you for your thoughtful and prayerful consideration of this matter.


