

# 5 Reminders in Dealing with Disappointment and Loss

"It's not fair!"

This statement always makes me think of a certain Calvin & Hobbes cartoon. Calvin asks his parents why he can't stay up late like they do, and he gives a loud, capital letter-type wail: "IT'S NOT FAIR!" His dad calmly replies, "The world isn't fair, Calvin." Calvin walks away disappointed, saying to himself "I know, but why isn't it ever unfair in my favor?"

As we face our current global health crisis, here are many things that just "aren't fair" right now. People are out of work. Parents are trying to keep up their children's education. High school seniors are missing some last memory-making experiences. Weddings are cancelled, and loved ones aren't able to attend funerals. Many college graduations are postponed. Weeks and months of marathon training has become for nothing as races are cancelled. Even the ways that people usually deal with stress, such as getting together with friends or going to the gym, are no longer an option. So far, I can't think of anyone for whom this global "unfairness" is acting in their favor.

Here are key points to dealing with the changes, losses, and unfairness that has soaked our world:

### #1. Acknowledge and accept your feelings.

It's okay to be sad, angry, frustrated, disappointed, or anxious during this uncertain time. In fact, it is more than okay – it's necessary! You need to process your pain in order to gain perspective. Communicate with a trusted friend or family member; explain what you are feeling and why.

### #2. Find favor in the midst of unfairness.

Perhaps right now you feel a loss over a cancelled event, a job layoff, or something similar – but consider what you can unexpectedly gain. Often in our busy lives we use the excuse "I just don't have enough time" as the reason we can't bond more with our kids, improve our physical health, or pursue a new hobby. What about the unexpected blessing of suddenly having some extra time on your hands?

Realize that how you cope with disappointing situations will shape the way you deal with the future. Accept things you can't control, feel free to be upset by them, and then let them go. Focus on the good that is still around you, and be thankful for it. Use this opportunity to learn how to make the best out of an unfair situation. Even when life is unfair, you have the power to make it unfair in your favor.

### #3. Respond to other people's losses with grace.

Everyone is affected to some degree by the changes happening in our world. True, some people's stress loads are lighter than others. For example, your sister may be upset that she has to re-learn algebra to help her teenager with homework, while you are a single mom and a nurse working overtime, trying to find babysitters for your five kids who are out of school. and - oh yeah, you're out of toilet paper. Or maybe you feel a bit guilty for being so stressed because you don't have it "as bad" as your best friend who just cancelled her wedding. Your loss is very real and very personal. So is your sister's. So is your friend's. So are the high school seniors who won't get to their last prom or their graduation. So is the multi-million dollar contracted basketball player whose season is suddenly over. Show empathy and grace to those dealing with any kind of loss. This is a hard time for everyone.

### #4. Be a model.

All people around you notice how you respond to crisis and disappointment. Your kids, your friends, your fiancé, your boss, etc. are all seeing the side of you that has to deal with change and are watching your emotions that come with it. If you have people in your life looking up to you right now, remember them when you face a choice of how to respond.

Also, if someone who is struggling comes to you for help, listen nonjudgmentally and let them know that they are not alone. Check in on your loved ones - OFTEN, because things are changing every day – to see how they are doing emotionally.

### #5. Remember who is in control.

It is human nature to want to have control over our lives. When life is uprooted and there is little we can do to change it, it's normal to feel anxiety and worry. Find comfort in knowing that we have a great big God who remains in control so that we don't have to be. And not only is God in control, He already knows how this will all turn out. "You do not realize now what I am doing, but someday you will understand," (John 13:7). We don't know how; we don't know when; and we don't know why. But what we do know is that God's got this.

"In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." John 16:33.



Maundy Thursday is the first Thursday in April, so our April meeting will be held on Thursday, April 8th at 2:00pm.





### **Conference of Presidents addresses concerns about the Equality Act**

Some have been asking about the potential impact of the proposed federal Equality Act on Christian churches and religious organizations, including our own synod. The Equality Act was first passed by the U.S. House of Representatives in 2019 but was not adopted by the U.S. Senate at that time. It was passed again by the House of Representatives on Feb. 25, 2021, and may well be introduced into the Senate in the near future.

The Equality Act seeks to make sexual orientation and gender identity a protected class, just like one's biological sex, under our nation's current federal non-discrimination laws. As a church we do not express opinions on purely political matters. However, the concern in this case is that aspects of the Equality Act could make it very difficult for the church to carry out its mission and could jeopardize our religious freedom to preach and teach God's Word faithfully.

At this point, there is much we don't know. For one thing, it is not known when or if the Senate will discuss the Equality Act, although it could be at any time. For another thing, if the Senate should pass the Equality Act, it is not known what specific restrictions would be imposed on Christian churches and institutions or what the result will be when legal firms appeal to the courts in regard to religious freedom concerns.

This concern is due to the fact that in its present form the Equality Act appears not to provide for religious exemptions. It is possible, therefore, that identifying certain types of behavior as sinful could be considered unlawful hate speech under the provisions of this act. It could result in the loss of our tax-exempt status. It could also affect the ability of our colleges to receive federal funding for scholarships, grants, and loans for their students. There are several other ways in which carrying out our normal daily operations as churches and schools could potentially be affected in regard to things like facilities, health insurance policies, and sports programs.

Our entire focus as a Christian church is to proclaim God's law and gospel in order to convict people of sin and to assure people of forgiveness through the sacrificial death of Christ our Savior. We recognize that the only way for people to have an appropriate view of any situation of life, including matters of sexual identity, is to know and believe in Jesus. As a result, we do not believe that seeking to prevent a law from coming into existence will change anyone's heart. We also do not make it our goal to simply change anyone's external behavior. Further, we do not in any way condone behavior that shows hatred or disrespect to any individual. Such behavior is also sinful.

Our desire and responsibility, however, is to continue practicing our faith in humility and love, as we share with ourselves and others what God says in his Word for our eternal good. As individual Christian citizens, you may well exercise your citizenship by contacting your U.S. senators to express any concerns you may have. We encourage all of you to pray that, if the Equality Act should become law, no aspect of the law will be allowed to compromise our ability to share God's Word freely. In other words, pray that religious exemptions be maintained, as has been the constitutional right the Lord has allowed us to enjoy for many years. While the Bible does not guarantee that right, it has been a blessing that we have cherished. If that should not be the case, then we further encourage your prayers that the Lord would give us the boldness and courage to be faithful to him, no matter the earthly consequences, as we work together as brothers and sisters in Christ to continue to carry out our Savior's mission. The work of God's kingdom will always move forward.

We will certainly keep alert to further developments and communicate those when appropriate.

God, have mercy on us and give us your peace, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

### LWMS announces plans for 2021 convention

he Lutheran Women's Missionary Society (LWMS) announced via Facebook Live on March 7 that its 2021 convention, originally planned for June 24-27, 2021, in Sharonville, Ohio, will be virtual again this year.

"We've been doing a lot of praying and brainstorming, and we came up with a solution for this year," said LWMS President Cynthia Natsis. "We have decided as a board that our 2021 convention . . . will have to be virtual again this year. We came to that decision because of many different circumstances, COVID-19 being the biggest one, of course." She continues to say that, at the time of the announcement. Ohio had gathering restrictions limited to 300 people and it's uncertain how that would change by June.

"We are excited to try our hand at another virtual convention. We have some exciting speakers," says Natsis. From Home Missions, Rev. Allen Kirschbaum, Spirit of Life, Caledonia, Mich., and Rev. Ryan Kolander, Palabra de Vida, Detroit, Mich., will be presenting. Gary and Beth Evans from the Central Africa Medical Mission. which is marking 60 years of service this year, will be talking about their work in Africa. From World Missions. Rev. Stephen Wiesenauer will share about the gospel work in East Asia. Additional workshops are also planned.

### Synodical Council winter 2021 meeting

The Synodical Council (SC) held its winter meeting last week via video conference.

The SC reviewed the financial results of the last fiscal year as well as the endof-calendar year results for Congregation Mission Offerings (CMO). Across the board, both in terms of the synod's ministry financial plan and regarding the financial position of the synod's departments, schools, and subsidiaries, the financial situation of the synod is much healthier than was expected. The SC acknowledged thanks for God's blessings on our synod and its congregations.

In view of the healthy financial situation, the SC approved an expenditure of \$400,000 to be used to fund some of the items on the "unfunded priority list." The SC Ministry Committee, with input from the President's Advisory Council, will determine in April which ministries will receive this funding.

The SC gave its final approval to the ministry financial plan (budget) for the next biennium that will be recommended to the synod convention in July. The plan, adopted unanimously and with the support of the Conference of Presidents, calls for a 2 percent increase in expenditures in each of the next two years.

The SC also resolved to move ahead with its recommendation to change the synod pension plan from a defined benefit plan to a defined contribution plan. A defined contribution plan would work more like a 401(k), giving called workers their own retirement accounts. The details of the plan were shared last year and will be shared again this spring before being considered by the synod in convention in July.

The SC made the following appointments:

- To the Board of Directors of the WELS Church Extension Fund: Mr. Seth Hanson, Mr. Tim Gensmer, and Mr. Ron Kerr were re-appointed for another term.
- To the Board of Directors of the WELS Investment Fund: Mr. Joel Luehmann,
   Mr. John Wenker, and Mr. Seth Hanson were re-appointed for another term.
- To the Retirement Program Commission: Mr. Lee Miller was re-appointed for another term; Rev. James Turriff was newly appointed.
- To the VEBA Commission: Mr. James Gabriel was newly appointed.
- To the Northwestern Publishing House Board of Directors: Mr. Joel Raasch, Mr. Matthew Groth, Rev. Steven Pagels were re-appointed for another term.

Communications Director Mr. Lee Hitter reported that during 2020 wels.net had more than two million visits to the website, with users in the U.S. and throughout the world making use of the digital content.

Technology Director Mr. Martin Spriggs reported that a third-party security firm was engaged to do a thorough assessment of hardware, software, security policies and procedures, as well as employee training. A preliminary report has been received and will be reviewed for appropriate recommendations to technology systems and practice. He also reported that hundreds of hours have been devoted to updating the CMM phone system to Microsoft Teams Telephony.

Director of the Ministry of Christian Giving Rev. Kurt Lueneburg reported that from 2010-2019 total congregational offerings have increased from \$295 million to just over \$345 million. Over that same period, the percent of congregations' dollars given to CMO has decreased from 7.1% to 6.2%. He also reported that over the past 15 years \$102 million has been given or committed to ministerial education and missions through the WELS endowments, managed by WELS Foundation. It is expected that distributions from these eight endowments will exceed \$1 million in 2021 for the first time.
