Every so often our news will carry a story about a school struggling with the question of going to mandatory uniforms.

It's easy to understand the logic. Some of the most respected people in our society are those who wear

uniforms. Proponents of school uniforms could probably produce studies that show that students are more likely to respect themselves and each other when wearing uniforms, too.

On the other hand, we also hear stories about people bringing disgrace to the uniforms they wear:

criminal charges against professional ballplayers, corruption in police departments, and sexual abuse by clergy. Examples such as these indicate that just putting on a uniform does not make a person better.

Listen to the apostle Paul describe a different kind of clothing: "Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience" (Colossians 3:12).

Notice that Paul isn't just describing a change in outward appearances. Nor is he suggesting that we can somehow will ourselves into better behavior.

We don't earn the right to wear the clothes Paul describes. They come from being loved by God.

It all starts with the compassion Jesus had that

moved him to lay down his life for the world.

Believing that Jesus loved us enough to die for us is what makes us one of his people. It also is what produces a change in our attitude.

As God's dearly loved people, we want to reflect the kind of

compassion Jesus showed. That is something that will be as plain to see as any uniform.

Real changes in our lives won't happen just because we put on a districtmandated or color-coordinated outfit. That clothing just changes us on the outside. The inner change begins when we are clothed with God's love.

We hope you will visit us soon to learn more about God's great compassion.

Where is your treasure?

A four-year-old boy received a zippered mini coin purse from his father. He carried it around in his pocket to store "lost" coins that he would find in public places. This boy never passed up the opportunity to pick up a quarter off the sidewalk or a nickel he found on the floor of a restaurant. When the coin purse got full, he would transfer the coins to his piggy bank. He, of course, did this with hopes of "getting rich."

Within a year, he ran into a problem: the zipper on the coin purse no longer worked, and the fabric began to tear. He showed it to his father, and immediately his father realized this was a teachable moment. He shared some of Jesus's words with him: "Provide money bags for yourselves that do not become old, a treasure in the heavens that will not fail, where no thief comes near, and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Luke 12:33b-34).

The son was obviously perplexed. So, the father explained, "Stuff on this earth doesn't last forever, and even money comes and goes. In heaven, everything lasts forever, and that's the gift Jesus gives to you because he died on the cross for you. Focus on picking up pieces of treasure from God's Word more than you focus on collecting coins from the sidewalk. They're more valuable."

Suddenly the son viewed his collection of coins much differently. When he saw his piggy bank, he was reminded of heaven and the unending treasures God gives through his Word. He also realized he could use some of the coins to help the Word of God spread through the work of his church, so he started putting some in the offering basket. Where his treasure was, there was his heart also.

Now that we've turned the corner to the second half of 2021, we're going to be looking ahead to extending our capital campaign entitled *Foundation for Our Future* for another year (through 2022). As your Stewardship Board, we want you to know two things: 1) we pray that the financial resources God has blessed you with always remind you of the everlasting treasures of heaven, and 2) we pray that you view your financial resources as a way to support making those treasures known through the ministry of Zion Lutheran Church and School: "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."



Why This Conflict?

The 2021-22 Multi-Congregational Bible Class Series

There are many conflicts in the world that in some way involve religion. To help laymen understand the backgrounds of these conflicts and how they should respond to them, the Multi-Congregational Bible Class Series, which has been taught under the name Thoroughly Lutheran for the last two years, will study in some depth five important current and historical conflicts. The teachers in this series will be Dr. Arthur Eggert of Peace, Pastor Peter Schlicht of Eastside, and Pastor Michael Willitz of Lord of Love.

The Formula of Concord – Healing 16th Century Lutheranism. Pastor Schlicht will begin the series by teaching about the Formula of Concord. This twelve-session course will reveal how the Lutheran Church became fragmented after the death of Martin Luther and what a small group of Lutheran scholars did to resolve the critical issues dividing Lutherans.

The Israeli-Palestinian Dispute – Dr. Eggert will then examine the roots of the Arab-Israeli conflict and why it is has gone on so long. In this four-session course he will explain the religious development of modern Judaism and Islam, and how they play into this seemingly unresolvable problem.

Lutheranism and Evangelicalism – It's seen on the television. It's heard over the radio. It's sold in Christian bookstores. In many regards, Evangelicalism seems to be the default expression of Christianity in America. Many Lutherans may not realize just how different our confession is. In a four-session course, Pastor Willitz will survey the teaching and practice of American Evangelicalism and present the Biblical, Lutheran alternative.

Science and Christianity – The topic of how Lutherans should view science is frequently occurring and often confusing. As someone well-versed in research science and Lutheran theology, Dr. Eggert will spend four sessions explaining how to understand the claims that often seem to put science in conflict with our faith and the teachings of the Scriptures.

The WELS/ELS-LCMS Split – The Birth and Demise of the Synodical Conference It has been 60 years since the Synodical Conference fell apart, and many Lutherans still feel the tragedy of this event through the divisions within their families. Dr. Eggert, using material from seminary professor Dr. John Brenner and his own personal involvement in the synodical break-up, will discuss the birth, troubled existence, and death of the Synodical Conference in a four-session course.

"Whatever became of them?"

Everyone remembers people from their past—classmates, neighbors, friends, even relatives. At some point, they were separated and eventually lost contact. Later, we may wonder, "Whatever became of them?"

By nature, all humans are sinful. There isn't a time in which we live without sin and its effects in this life. David asserts, "Surely I was sinful at birth, sinful from the time my mother conceived me" (Psalm 51:5). Paul echoes, "There is no one righteous, not even one" (Romans 3:10). Indeed, since the fall into sin, no human knows righteousness or holiness.

But God sees it differently. He does not see us for who we are. Rather, he sees us for who we have **become** by faith in his Son. Paul writes, "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:21). Instead of seeing us as we are, God sees what we **become** through the perfect work of Christ. Through faith in him, we **become** pure



and blameless. God sees us as holy because of what Jesus *became* for us. Many writers have explained Jesus' substitutionary work for sinners. Perhaps none so effectively states it as Luther who wrote, "Learn to know Christ and him crucified. Learn to sing to him, and say, 'Lord Jesus, you are my righteousness, I am your sin. You have taken upon yourself what is mine and given me what is yours. You have *become* what you were not so that I might *become* what I was not."

Lakeside's biennial theme is *Become*. In a single word, we hope to remind our students and families, our faculty and staff, board members, and those in our federation that we have become righteous through Christ alone. By God's grace, we have "become the righteousness of God." This is far better than any earthly gift or achievement. It creates in us godly self-worth and value. It encourages and moves us to glorify Christ through whom we have become righteous.

"Whatever became of them?" By God's grace, we know and believe that all believers have become the righteousness of God through Christ Jesus.




