The most overlooked festival

It's all in the name.

Perhaps the most overlooked church festival falls on January 1. It's not New Year's Day which is a secular holiday. Rather, it's the naming of Jesus.

In Matthew 1, Jesus' genealogy, beginning with Abraham, is laid out. Following that, the content of Joseph's dream about his yet-to-be-born child is revealed. In that dream, the angel commanded him, "You are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21). Following Jewish custom, a male baby was circumcised and named eight days after his birth. Using December 25 as the traditional date of Jesus' birth, this naming would have occurred on what we now call January 1.

The name Jesus is Hebrew. Its original form is Yeshua or Y'shua, meaning to deliver or rescue. It was a common name. Perhaps many baby boys at this time were named Jesus, hoping that one of them would be the <u>savior</u> to break Roman oppression.

AND HE GAVE HIM THE NAME JESUS.

MATTHEW 1:25, NIV

But the angel's command to Joseph added, "He will save his people from their sins." This was no ordinary child. He would be the Savior from sin. This is further explained in Matthew I where the holy writer quotes the prophet Isaiah, "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel' (which means 'God with us')." (Matthew 1:23). Mary and Joseph's son whom they named Jesus is the Son of God. He is the one that God the Father sent as the sacrifice for humankind's sins. By his resurrection, he shattered death and now reigns on high as our victorious, eternal King.

So, on January 1, continue to celebrate that God has given us a new year to live in his grace. But, also pause that day to recall God's greatest show of grace—a Savior, named Jesus, who redeems us from sin, death, and Satan.

Remember, it's all in the name.

LAKESIDE GOOD NEWS and NOTES

- Our Warrior volleyball team's generosity made NBC 15 news. When Edgewood withdrew from the state competition, our team reached out with a note signed by each member of our team and a gift card for them to go out and celebrate their season—when the time is right.
- Our Aerospace Engineering class wrapped up a unit on Flight with a solo flight simulation activity. They also designed airfoils that were tested for lift and drag using our new JetStream 500 wind tunnel, which was provided by a generous donor. These are the same tests that engineers do when designing airplane wings.
- → Five Warriors were named to the All-Region Team by the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association, including seniors Nate Chesterman for outside linebacker (Peace, Sun Prairie); Micah Cody, running back and inside linebacker (St. John, Juneau); Tersony Vater, defensive back (St. Luke, Watertown); John O'Donnell, tight end and defensive end (Shepherd's Fold); and sophomore Ben Buxa, o-line and defensive end (Immamuel,



Farmington).

- Because Teens for Christ has not been able to host New Friends—one of our favorite events—the students created and dropped off Blessings Bags. Each bag included crafts and treats, handwritten notes, and pictures from past New Friends events.
- ★ Lakeside's National Honor Society officers along with Karen Fischer, a counselor from Christian Family Solutions—kicked off our six-session resiliency training. Using the Cornerstone curriculum, a three-person team from CFS meets with students in every religion class, equipping them with tools and strategies to develop their resilience, enhance their quality of life, and decrease stress and anxiety. Lakeside is the first high school in the nation to offer resiliency training through Cornerstone!



- Mr. Doering's senior American Government classes practiced some citizenship skills as "presidential candidates" presented their positions in mock debate. This debate is one part of an entire campaign where students design posters, give speeches, and create a video. Candidates will pass through two primaries and a caucus before the field is reduced to two candidates. MLC student teacher Alex Quist, a student teacher of Mr. Doering's pursuing Secondary Social Studies and Elementary Education, served as moderator for the debates.
- Our Tech Ed classes are wrapping up semester projects. In metals, students are creating new drainage covers for the soccer field, a drift trike, homemade fire pit, and a pondweed scraper for Monona. In Environmental Science, they are making animal calls and habitat homes. The CAD class is using the 3D printer to create a reinforced clothes hanger, personal indoor soccer ball, no-drip mug, foldable keychain with LED light, and fishing lure with removable hooks.
- At our 2nd quarter's Pastors Day, 25 pastors from 25 congregations attended, including one who was here for the first time! Of these, 20 were from the federation. 371 students, or 86.9% of our Warrior teens, met with their shepherds!
- With seating limited at our events, keep up with many of our athletics on our Livestream page livestream.com/llhslive.
- ★ At the Fall Capitol Conference Math Meet (held virtually), both Varsity Team 1 and JV Team 1 took first place. Top individual scorers among te conference for varsity were first place Douglas Weittenhiller (Peace, Sim Prairie) and second place Austin Schwab (St. Paul, Fort). Top overall individual scorers for JV were first place Isaac Winters (St. Litke, Watertown) with a perfect score and Juan Gulrud (St. John, Waterloo) in second place.
- National Honor Society teens also hosted a school wide "Snack" collection for our friends at the Milwaukee Lighthouse for Youth. Lighthouse has told us that a variety of snacks and drinks would bring the biggest smiles to the teens who gather there, and our



teens responded with tables full of personal-size, wrapped goodies delivered to LYC.

♦ Student Council hosted its school-wide semester mission giving opportunity to help the building of our first church in Mahahual, Mexico. Mid-year graduation at Martin Luther College

ven though on-campus learning at Martin Luther College, New Ulm, Minn., has been interrupted for a time, we are happy to see that the work of the college to prepare young people for the public ministry continues. One visible reminder of that is the announcement that 22 students have completed their studies and have received their diplomas and graduated mid-year.

While most of those students will defer their assignment into the public ministry until next spring, several of them will be assigned to their field of labor when the Assignment Committee meets on Fri., Dec. 18.

Plans have been put in place to welcome students back to campus in January. In addition, President Richard Gurgel has announced that the governing board of Martin Luther College will be distributing an additional \$200,000 in financial assistance to help students who return for the second semester.

Even in difficult times, God's work—and his blessings—continue in our congregations and in our synod.

Update from Vietnam

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, the Lord is always with his church. Christians in the Hmong Fellowship Church in Vietnam are continuing to reach out to lost souls. In 2020, the Holy Spirit brought more than 12,000 Hmong people throughout Vietnam to faith in Jesus. The Hmong Fellowship Church has grown from 126,000 to 138,000 members.

Rev. Zang, one of the Hmong leaders, said, "Most of the pastors in the Hmong Fellowship Church have heard many scary things through television and radio about the impact of COVID-19, but they see it as less dangerous when compared to the lost souls who have no chance to hear the gospel before they die."

Rev. Fong and his evangelism team reached out to many villages in his area. The Lord blessed their efforts, and they were able to establish nine new mission congregations.


The Lord also has provided a way for WELS to continue training the Hmong Fellowship Church leaders. In November, the Vietnam mission team responded to the request of the Hmong Fellowship Church and offered Zoom training to 57 students. WELS provided phones and internet connectivity when needed to allow these students to participate in online training classes. Rev. Joel Nitz taught the gospel

of Mark, and Rev. Bounkeo Lor taught law and gospel. Instruction via Zoom is something new for the Hmong Fellowship Church, but the students were very excited. Some students even asked permission for their wives and parents to join the training as well.

While the Hmong Fellowship
Church has been tremendously
blessed, there are also some big
challenges ahead. More than 1,360
leaders are waiting for someone
to train them in the Word of God.
They are also waiting to build more
churches for new believers to worship their Lord. Lor explains that the
Hmong Fellowship Church leaders
are very skilled at doing evangelism
in their communities. With proper
training and materials, these men
will continue to share God's Word.

The theological education center building project in Vietnam is still active but has been delayed due to COVID-19. Once Lor is able to visit Vietnam, he will arrange a Zoom or face-to-face meeting, if possible, between WELS and Vietnamese representatives. The government also wants to make this project happen as quickly as possible.

Lor shares that brothers and sisters in Vietnam send their greetings and say, "Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!" to all WELS members. They appreciate your help and support, especially to train their leaders in the Word of God. They also ask for your continued support and prayers.
