Topic: Writing

Standard 1

Students will create or produce writing to communicate with different audiences for a variety of purposes.

Our students will:

Kindergarten

1.1. Write simple sentences

Primary Grades (1-2)

- 1.1 Understand that sentences must make sense.
- 1.2 Be able to print legibly with correct spacing.
- 1.3 Understand that we write for different purposes and audiences.
- 1.4 Spell frequently used words correctly.

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 1.1 Be able to determine the author's purpose for writing and then write to share information, persuade others, and entertain.
- 1.2 Legibly print and write cursive using correct letter formations, letter connections and appropriate height and spacing.

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 1.1 Write a comparison / contrast paragraph for a specific audience with sufficient details in a clear and concise manner.
- 1.2 Write a personal narrative based on experience that uses descriptive language and detail effectively, presents a sequence of events, reveals a theme, and contains personal dialogue.
- 1.3 Write a persuasive letter for a specific audience.
- 1.4 Write a "How To" instructional composition in proper sequence, using clear and precise language.
- 1.5 Write a description using vivid language and utilizing the 5 senses.
- 1.6 Write a short story including the elements of setting, theme, characterization, and plot (posing a problem, climax, and resolution of the problem).
- 1.7 Use a variety of writing technologies, including pen and paper as well as computers.
- 1.8 Write for a variety of readers, including peers, teachers, younger children, other adults, adapting content, style and structure to fit the audience and situation.

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 1.1 Write a coherent and complete expository piece, with sufficient detail to fulfill its purpose, sufficient evidence to support its assertions, language appropriate for its intended audience, and clear organization of ideas.
- 1.2 Write a persuasive piece (such as a letter to a specific person or a script promoting a particular product) that includes a clear position, discernible tone, and a coherent argument with reliable evidence.
- 1.3 Write a narrative based on experience that uses descriptive language and detail effectively, presents a sequence of events, and reveals a theme.
- 1.4 Write clear and pertinent responses to verbal or visual material that communicate, explain, and interpret the reading or viewing experience to a specific audience.
- 1.5 Write creative fiction that includes major and minor characters, a coherent plot, effective imagery, descriptive language, and concrete detail.
- 1.6 Write in a variety of situations (during an exam, on a computer) and adapt strategies, such as revision, technology, and the use of reference materials, to the situation.
- 1.7 Become proficient in using a variety of writing technologies including pen and paper as well as computers.
- 1.8 Write for a variety of readers, including peers, teachers, and other adults, adapting content, style, and structure to fit the audience and situation.

Standard 2

Follow the steps of the writing process to publish clear and effective writing.

Our students will:

Kindergarten

- 2.1 Participate with the teacher to brainstorm ideas for writing.
- 2.2. Learn how to revise and edit their work and practice the skill.
- 2.3 Practice writing the upper and lower case letters using the correct formation.
- 2.4 Practice incorporating more descriptive words in their work as they write.
- 2.5 Be introduced to the concept of identifying and using cause and effect in their writing.
- 2.6 Be introduced to the concept of using compare and contrast in their writing.

Primary Grades (1-2)

- 2.1 Write interesting and meaningful sentences.
- 2.2 Develop an understanding of cause and effect in writing.
- 2.3 Learn the basic parts of a friendly letter and then be able to write a letter.
- 2.4 Write for an audience with some descriptive words.
- 2.5 Revise and edit their work with guidance.

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 2.1 Construct a meaningful and interesting paragraph of four or five sentences.
- 2.2 Write a short story which includes the story elements (characters, setting, plot).
- 2.3 Be introduced to ALL the steps in the writing process and practice these steps as they write.
- 2.4 Be able to identify and use figurative language in their own writing.
- 2.5 Be introduced to peer editing and how it can be used to improve writing.

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 2.1 Produce and edit multiple drafts, including finished pieces, that demonstrate the capacity to generate, focus, and organize ideas for communicating with a specific audience
- 2.2 Identify questions and strategies for improving drafts in writing conferences with other students and with the teacher.
- 2.3 Produce a developed, organized, and effective response in correct English when writing to a prompt.

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 2.1 Demonstrate the ability to edit and revise the language, organization, content, and tone of multiple drafts in order to fulfill a specific purpose for communicating with a specific audience.
- 2.2 Identify questions and strategies for improving drafts in writing conferences with a teacher or fellow students.
- 2.3 Produce a well-developed, well organized, and effective response in correct English and an appropriate voice when writing to a prompt.

Standard 3

Understand the function of various forms, structures, and mechanics of standard American English and use them appropriately.

Our students will:

Kindergarten

- 3.1 Identify the naming (noun) and telling (verb) parts of a sentence.
- 3.2 Be introduced to basic capitalization rules.
- 3.3 Be introduced to basic punctuation marks.
- 3.4 Develop the ability to isolate sounds in a word in order to spell the word.
- 3.5 Identify the initial, medial, and final sound in a word.
- 3.6 Identify a variety of high frequency words.
- 3.7 Practice using the correct word order in sentences and when asking a question.

Primary Grades (1-2)

- 3.1 Write sentences using capital letters and correct ending marks (exclamation marks, question marks, and periods.)
- 3.2 Develop understanding and successfully identify a noun, pronoun, verb, adjective, and adverb.
- 3.3 Know the proper title abbreviations for certain occupations and respectful titles for adults.
- 3.4 Develop an understanding that a sentence must make sense.
- 3.5 Identify the difference between a true sentence and a fragment.
- 3.6 Develop the use of correct punctuation when writing a sentence.

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 3.1 Demonstrate leveled competence in using the correct capitalization and appropriate punctuation when writing sentences and paragraphs.
- 3.2 Understand and construct a sentence using the 8 parts of speech.
- 3.3 Review the Parts of Speech learned in grades 1-2 and also be able to identify conjunctions.
- 3.4 Identify and write four kinds of sentences (decl., imper., inter., exclam.) using the proper punctuation.
- 3.5 Correctly spell leveled words.
- 3.6 Be introduced to subject and verb agreement along with pronoun and noun (antecedent) agreement.
- 3.7 Review complete subject and complete predicate and then be introduced to simple subject and simple predicate.

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 3.1 Use and identify all eight parts of speech.
- 3.2 Form and use the simple tenses to indicate the relative order of events.
- 3.3 Understand and employ principles of agreement, including subject-verb, pronounnoun (antecedent), and preposition-pronoun.
- 3.4 Punctuate simple, compound, and complex sentences correctly.
- 3.5 Correctly capitalize and punctuate the four basic sentence types.
- 3.6 Spell leveled words correctly and use effective strategies for spelling unfamiliar words.

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 3.1 Demonstrate proficiency in identifying and using the eight basic parts of speech and their various forms.
- 3.2 Identify and use correct tenses to indicate the relative order of events.

- 3.3 Understand and employ principles of agreement such as subject/verb, pronoun/noun, etc.
- 3.4 Demonstrate proficiency in using all mechanics including punctuation and capitalization.
- 3.5 Spell frequently used words correctly and use effective strategies for spelling unfamiliar words.

Topic: Research & Inquiry

Standard 1

Conduct research and inquiry on self-selected or assigned topics, issues, or problems and use an appropriate form to communicate their findings.

Our students will:

Kindergarten

1.1 Perform research and writing using procedures that build upon each other.

Primary Grades (1-2)

- 1.1 Develop competence in brainstorming for ideas.
- 1.2 Learn to use different reference materials for written work such as a dictionary, and an encyclopedia
- 1.3 Understand how to use a table of contents and a glossary.

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 1.1 Be introduced to and work with a variety of research tools.
- 1.2 Be able to work through the problem-solving process with classmates and alone.
- 1.3 Understand how to use reference materials such as a dictionary, thesaurus, and encyclopedia in order to find information and use it in their writing.
- 1.4 Be able to use a table of contents, index, and glossary in school textbooks.
- 1.5 Be able to interpret and create charts and graphs in order to obtain and share information

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 1.1 Develop questioning techniques, narrow the focus of a topic, use prior knowledge, and develop a basic plan for gathering information.
- 1.2 Conduct simple polls and interviews.
- 1.3 Conduct research by identifying, locating, exploring, and effectively using appropriate sources of information including encyclopedias, almanacs,

- dictionaries, library catalogs, indexes to periodicals, and various electronic search engines.
- 1.4 Recognize, record, organize, and acknowledge information pertinent to a project.
- 1.5 Present the results of inquiry, reporting orally and in writing, using appropriate visual aids (graphs and charts).

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 1.1 Formulate research questions and focus investigation on relevant and accessible sources of information.
- 1.2 Use multiple sources to identify and locate information pertinent to research including encyclopedias, almanacs, dictionaries, library catalogs, indexes to periodicals, and various electronic search engines.
- 1.3 Conduct interviews, field studies, and experiments and use specialized resources (such as almanacs, fact books, pamphlets, and technical manuals) when appropriate to an investigation.
- 1.4 Compile, organize, and evaluate information, take notes that record and summarize what has been learned, and extend the investigation to other sources.
- 1.5 Review and evaluate the usefulness of information gathered in an investigation.
- 1.6 Produce an organized written and oral report that presents and reflects on findings, draws sound conclusions, adheres to the conventions for preparing a manuscript, and gives proper credit to sources.

Topic: Oral Language

Standard 1

Orally communicate information, opinions, and ideas effectively to different audiences for a variety of purposes.

Our students will:

Kindergarten

- 1.1 Develop the ability to speak in front of the class when sharing their work.
- 1.2 Read aloud simple stories.
- 1.3 Participate in group readings.

Primary Grades (1-2)

- 1.1 Share their written work with a peer.
- 1.2 Read aloud stories for appropriate grade level.
- 1.3 Read aloud with fluency.
- 1.4 Share some special personal event with the class with confidence and competence.

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 1.1 Be able to retell stories in their own words.
- 1.2 Be introduced to a variety of oral book reports and practice sharing them with their classmates.
- 1.3 Gain confidence as they speak in front of their classmates.
- 1.4 Read and speak aloud with proper volume, fluency, and expression.

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 1.1 Prepare effective oral presentations which include good eye contact, projection, tone, volume, rate, speed, and articulation.
- 1.2 Perform expressive reading of prose, poetry, and drama, and choral reading.
- 1.3 Prepare and conduct interviews.
- 1.4 Present a variety of oral book reports.
- 1.5 Be able to make proper introductions of old to young, young to old, and peer to peer.
- 1.6 Become skillful participants in group discussions.
- 1.7 Speak from notes or a brief outline, communicating precise information and accurate instructions in clearly organized and sequenced detail.

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 1.1 Share brief impromptu remarks about topics of interest to oneself and others. (Sharing in class or outside of class)
- 1.2 Speak from notes or an outline to relate an experience in descriptive detail, with a sense of timing and decorum appropriate to an occasion.
- 1.3 Perform expressive oral reading of prose, poetry, and drama.
- 1.4 Prepare and conduct interviews.
- 1.5 Differentiate between formal and informal contexts and employ an appropriate style of speaking, adjusting language, gestures, rate and volume according to audience and purpose.
- 1.6 Observe appropriate speech etiquette in social situations.

Standard 2

Listen to and comprehend oral communication.

Our students will:

<u>Kindergarten</u>

- 2.1 Follow basic directions.
- 2.2 Develop the understanding that most literature contains a main idea with details to support it.
- 2.3 Retell stories in proper sequence.

- 2.4 Be introduced to the concept of plot, setting, and characters in a story and practice identifying them.
- 2.5 Predict events and outcomes in a story.
- 2.6 Listen to different genres of literature and answer factual or interpretive questions relating to them.
- 2.7 Distinguish between different genres of literature.
- 2.8 Use more complex vocabulary in their speaking.

Primary Grades (1-2)

- 2.1 Become competent with following oral directions.
- 2.2 Give oral directions appropriately.
- 2.3 Verbally answer questions given by teacher.
- 2.4 Become secure with the ability to identify different genres of written materials.
- 2.5 Continue to build vocabulary.

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 2.1 Be competent in giving and following oral directions.
- 2.2 Practice following multiple-step directions.
- 2.3 Comprehend leveled vocabulary and work to increase it.
- 2.4 Master identifying different genres.
- 2.5 Be introduced to and practice distinguishing fact from opinion.

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 2.1 Explore the purposes for listening, such as gaining information or being entertained, and take notes as appropriate.
- 2.2 Recall significant details and sequence accurately.
- 2.3 Be able to orally repeat and follow directions that have been written or verbally stated.
- 2.4 Summarize key points of a story or discussion.
- 2.5 Distinguish fact from opinion and provide evidence to support opinions.

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 2.1 Summarize and explain the information conveyed in an oral communication, accounting for the key ideas, structure, and relationship of parts to the whole.
- 2.2 Distinguish among purposes for listening, such as gaining information or being entertained.
- 2.3 Understand and follow simple and complex oral directions.
- 2.4 Give pertinent oral directions in a demonstration.
- 2.5 Recall and relate significant details and sequence accurately.

Standard 3

Participate effectively in discussion.

Our students will:

Kindergarten

- 3.1 Volunteer relevant information to a discussion, ask relevant questions to a topic, and answer the questions posed.
- 3.2 Properly use eye contact when speaking to others or in front of the class.
- 3.3 Be introduced to the concept of summarizing a story.
- 3.4 Use proper strategies in a discussion, such as listening, speaking when it is their turn, and avoiding interruptions

Primary Grades (1-2)

- 3.1 Develop participation in discussions.
- 3.2 Listen when they are being spoken to.
- 3.3 Wait their turn and show respect to the speaker.
- 3.4 Develop the ability to summarize.

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 3.1 Become more comfortable as they participate in small and large group discussions as an active listener and also an active participant.
- 3.2 Continue developing their summarizing skills by identifying the main idea and supporting details.
- 3.3 Develop patience as they wait their turn and show respect by listening quietly and attentively to the person speaking.

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 3.1 Volunteer relevant information, ask relevant questions, and answer questions directly.
- 3.2 Reflect on the ideas and opinions of others and respond thoughtfully.
- 3.3 Respond appropriately to higher level questioning.
- 3.4 Ask for clarification and explanation of unfamiliar words and ideas.
- 3.5 Summarize information conveyed through discussion.
- 3.6 Participate in discussion without dominating.
- 3.7 Recognize supported and unsupported statements.

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 3.1 Listen attentively and demonstrate respect for the opinions of others with appropriate facial expressions, body language, and response cues.
- 3.2 Invite opinions of others into a discussion.

- 3.3 Seek clarification through questions.
- 3.4 Summarize main points and paraphrase contributions.
- 3.5 Distinguish between supported and unsupported statements.
- 3.6 Evaluate the reliability of information in a communication.
- 3.7 Explain personal opinions by citing sources and evidence.
- 3.8 Respond clearly and tactfully to questions and comments.
- 3.9 Accept and use constructive criticism.
- 3.10 Participate without dominating.

Topic: Media and Technology

Standard 1

Use computers to acquire, organize, analyze, and communicate information.

Our students will:

Kindergarten- Grade 4

- 1.1 Use the computer to play learning games.
- 1.2 Learn that the letters of the alphabet, which are used to write words, correspond to the letters on the keys of the keyboard.
- 1.3 Write simple words and sentences using the computer.
- 1.4 Begin using the computer to publish written works.

Middle and Upper Grades (5-8)

- 1.1 Use word processing skills to produce written language arts projects.
- 1.2 Create, store, and retrieve electronic files.
- 1.3 Use a search engine effectively
- 1.4 Access information using electronic reference sources such as dictionaries, encyclopedias, almanacs, indexes, web pages, and news groups.
- 1.5 Explore the uses of electronic messages such as e-mail.
- 1.6 Perform basic computer operations on various platforms.

Standard 2

Make informed judgments about media and products.

Our students will:

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 2.1 Be introduced to propaganda techniques used in media.
- 2.2 Develop an understanding when broad generalizations are being used.

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 2.1 Identify the intent or appeal behind products and messages promoted via media
- 2.2 Recognize basic propaganda techniques.
- 2.3 Identify images and symbols central to particular messages and compare the effect of particular symbols and images seen in various media.
- 2.4 Develop God-pleasing criteria for selecting or avoiding specific broadcast programs and periodicals.

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 2.1 Recognize common structural features found in print and broadcast advertising.
- 2.2 Identify and explain the use of stereotypes and biases evident in various media.
- 2.3 Compare the effect of particular symbols and images seen in various media.
- 2.4 Develop God-pleasing criteria for selecting or avoiding specific broadcast programs and periodicals.

Standard 3

Create and share media products appropriate to audience and purpose.

Our students will:

Primary and Intermediate Grades (1-4)

- 3.1 Identify the different parts of a newspaper article.
- 3.2 Create a simple newspaper with advertisement and news articles.
- 3.3 Create simple signs and posters.

Middle Grades (5-6)

- 3.1 Write news articles appropriate for familiar media.
- 3.2 Create simple advertising messages and graphics for familiar media.
- 3.3 Prepare, perform, and tape simple radio and television scripts.
- 3.4 Prepare and perform school announcements and program scripts.
- 3.5 Create a multi-media project to share with a specified audience.
- 3.6 Publish a school newspaper edition utilizing informative writing, graphics, and photographs.
- 3.7 Recognize how messages are adjusted for different audiences.
- 3.8 Identify advertising strategies and techniques aimed at various age groups.

Upper Grades (7-8)

- 3.1 Write informal articles that target audiences of a variety of publications.
- 3.2 Use desktop publishing to produce products such as brochures and newsletters designed for particular organizations and audiences.
- 3.3 Create Powerpoints to assist in oral presentations.
- 3.4 Create video and audiotapes designed for particular audiences.
- 3.5 Plan a promotion or campaign that involves broadcast and print media production and distribution.
- 3.6 Analyze how messages may be affected by financial factors such as sponsorship.
- 3.7 Identify advertising strategies and techniques aimed at teenagers.

Standard 4

Analyze and edit media work as appropriate to audience and purpose.

Our students will:

Intermediate Grades (3-4)

- 4.1 Watch and provide constructive criticism on media work.
- 4.2 Introduce questions students should ask themselves while watching a media work. Age appropriate? Appropriate content? Appropriate for a child of God?

Upper Grades (5-8)

- 4.1 Revise media productions by adding, deleting, and adjusting the sequence and arrangement of information, images, or other content as necessary to improve focus, clarity, or effect.
- 4.2 Provide feedback to (and receive from) peers about the content, organization, and overall effect of media work.
- 4.3 Develop criteria for comprehensive feedback according to Christian values on the quality of media work and use that feedback during production.
