The Measure of a Mustard Seed


Jesus told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. Though it is the smallest of all your seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and perch in its branches" (Matthew 13:31,32). Who is America's richest man? America's tallest mountain? Largest lake? Largest city? Most populous state? If you answered Elon Musk, Denali (Mount McKinley), Lake Superior, New York City, and California, you are part of the proof that Americans pay attention to big things. We live in bigger houses, eat larger meals, and work longer hours than almost any other people in the world. We tend to live by the maxim, "Bigger is better."

But Jesus takes the "less is more" approach. He says: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed." Have you ever seen a mustard seed? It's so small that you could hold thousands in your hand. Why would Jesus tell us this? Because it's possible to be so focused on what looks big and impressive that we overlook him and his blessings.

It's a common mistake. At first glance, there was nothing big or impressive about Jesus. When he came to establish his kingdom, he arrived as a child of a poor girl in a conquered country. He was born in a barn. He grew up in an obscure village. His followers were nobodies. He never wrote a book or held a high position. He never lived in a palace or even a house of his own. After a few years in the public eye, he was killed on a cross like a common slave. On Good Friday, he looked small and powerless.

When Jesus spoke about the mustard seed, he gave us a short story that speaks volumes for our lives. The measure of a mustard seed is not its tiny size but the huge plant that it grows into. In the same way, the measure of Jesus' humble life and death is not how many people missed its meaning at the time but what he accomplished. By his perfect life and his innocent death, Jesus has freed the world from the guilt of sin. Countless millions who have put their trust in him have become part of his eternal kingdom.

When Jesus rose from his humble grave to conquer death on Easter morning, he proved that what seems small and weak can be amazingly powerful. It's Easter time again—why not celebrate by exploring what his life and death and resurrection can mean in your life? You might be surprised!

"Hearing God's Word regularly and being able to worship with my brothers and sisters in Christ is very important to me and prepares me for the week ahead."

1. Let's start with your family: Where did you grow up? What family connections do you have at Zion?

I was born at St. Columbus Hospital in Chicago, Illinois. During my childhood my family moved frequently but found our forever home in Columbus after my aunt, uncle, cousins, and a few other family members moved here in the early seventies. When my grandfather passed away, me, my brother and mother moved to his home in Columbus. My brother and I enjoyed being close to our cousins and the opportunity to spend time with them at their home in the country. Later my mother, Delphine, married Harold Schaefer, and blended our families. Harold was a life-long member of Zion and one of the reasons we also began attending services here. All my family members belong to Zion Church and our children attended Zion school together.

2. What do you want people to know about each of your kids? I have four grown children, all of whom live in the area. Erich, who is raising his daughter, Rhiannon, is a selfstarter and has enjoyed being his own boss and business owner at various times. He was a student in Mrs. Buege's first preschool class at Zion. Evan, and his wife Lindsey, are busy raising their children, Mallory, Watson, and Eleanor. Evan works as an electrician and in his spare time, wields a chainsaw to cut wood for his ever-growing woodpile. Kathryn and her husband Dillon recently welcomed their first child, Lillian. Kathryn is tender hearted and aspires to be a Proverbs 31 wife and mother. Madelyn is one of the bravest and strongest young ladies I know. She has a positive can-do attitude along with an independent streak. She was the last to leave the nest and is now pursuing her dream of grooming dogs (and owning them). I was blessed to have been able to send my children to Zion school. By the time the Madelyn graduated from Zion, I had children that attended Zion for twenty-eight consecutive school years!

3. Someone asks you what you do for a living. What do you tell them?

I work for the Bank of Sun Prairie in the Trust Department as a Trust Assistant. I am responsible for the day-to-day operations of the department. I began my career with the bank in Mortgage Processing but after Covid and the historically loan interest rates we experienced at that time, I longed for more balance in my life. One of the nice things

about working for a bank is that it offers many different opportunities to find what you like to do best. The move to the Trust Department, allowed me to find this balance. One of the requirements of my job is to do community



volunteer work. For the last seven years, I have been teaching Junior Achievement to 4^{th} graders at a Christian school in Sun Prairie. Financial literacy is my passion and I love seeing children and young adults learn about finances and the world of possibilities it opens up for them.

4 When you do get time off, what do you like to do with it? I am still a work in progress and trying to figure that out! I spent most of my adult years raising my children and being involved with their activities. My children were born in three different decades so you can imagine that I had been actively parenting for a few years. Now, as I begin to reach retirement age, I am trying to find out what it is I like to do. I enjoy spending time with my grandchildren, reading a good book or piecing together a puzzle (no less than 1000 pieces). I also started making bread and would like to learn to quilt. I do know that I do not like to mow my lawn or shovel my walks in my free time!

5. At what habits do you work to keep your faith strong? I make it a priority to start each day in God's word! To help me in my daily walk with Jesus, I begin with our Meditations booklet, read the Bible, and bring my requests to God in prayer. I use the People's Bible as it allows me to better understand the verses I have just read, especially in some of the more difficult books of the Bible. Hearing God's Word regularly and being able to worship with my brothers and sisters in Christ is very important to me and prepares me for the week ahead.

6. How did you come to be a part of Zion? If you are inviting someone to come to church, what do you tell them?

After we moved to Columbus and I began 7th grade, I made a friend whose family belonged to Zion and was going to begin attending Confirmation Classes. I wanted to be confirmed and belong to Zion! Although I was baptized Lutheran, our family did not regularly attend church as I was growing up and did not have a church home. Before committing to Zion, my mother wanted to see what else Columbus had to offer. The Lord had other plans for our family and Zion became our church. We have a welcoming congregation, a school to help parents in bringing up their children in the training and instruction of the Lord but more importantly, we are strong in the Word and teach

both Law and Gospel. It is a comfort to me that I can worship at any of our Synod's congregations and hear God's word taught in its truth and purity.

7. What are the hardest personal challenges to your faith that you face today? What do you do to deal with those challenges? I have a tendency to worry; the devil knows the middle of the night is his opportunity to snare me and put doubt in my heart. When the worries of this world consume me, I thank God for all my blessings. God has always seen me through, protects me, and continues to provide for me. If I suffer from a particular worry, I like to commit a Bible verse to memory to help me through. Currently my go-to is John 16:33. I think this is very fitting for the times we are living in. I also pray that God keeps me strong and steadfast in my faith until he calls me home.

8. What challenges do you see facing our church in the near future? What do you hope stays the same as time goes on? I think the biggest challenge facing us at this time is getting the new school built in a timely manner and raising the funds to begin construction.

My hopes and prayers will be that Zion will ALWAYS remain strong in the Word. God's word is the same today, as it was yesterday, and will be tomorrow.



What is the Easter Vigil?

In the Old Testament, believers waited though the night of the Passover for God to deliver them from the Egyptians. For nearly two-thousand years now, Christians have gathered for worship in anticipation of the celebration of God's greater deliverance: the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.



What is the history of the Vigil?

Since it is through Baptism that the Christian is unite Christ's death and resurrection (Romans 6:3-4), the Eavigil has always had a strong connection to Baptism. Daback to 2nd century Jerusalem, it was in this service that adult Christians were baptized and brought into membership.

What happens at the Vigil today?

We celebrate the reality of the resurrection in Communion and, with sins forgiven, anticipate our own.


