

7 Questions for Chris Henning

1. Where did you grow up and go to school? I was born and raised in Columbus, Wisconsin. I went to the Columbus public school, elementary, middle and high school.

2. How did you decide to go into the military? I have always been fascinated with the history of warfare, tactics and leadership ever since I was little. Of course, I always played army man with the neighborhood kids around our block. When I was a junior in high school, my dad was hounding on me about what I wanted to do for a career. He always said, "You should think about what you want to do." "Did you figure out what kind of job you want?" Finally one weekday I had had enough of this police line of questioning. He exclaimed "I have vacation today. Do you want me to talk to an Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Air Force recruiter for you while you are at school?" I thought yes, anything to get you to stop asking me anymore questions. After school that day I came home and my dad talked to me about all of the interesting things the recruiter talked to him about.

They all sounded very intriguing. So later that week my parents and I took a trip to Madison to talk to the Marine Recruiter together. My mind was blown at how many things the Marines has to offer me. I started working out with the Marines every Friday night and in the summer time the physical training dates fluctuated a little bit. I loved working out with the Marines so much, I seriously thought about my future and thought this is what I wanted. I wanted to be A Marine.

3. What was the most rewarding aspect of being a Marine? The most challenging? I think if you ask any Marine that ever served the question: what was the most rewarding thing about being a Marine? The most frequent answer would

probably be earning the title Marine. Marine boot-camp is the hardest there is in the United States. Bootcamp is grueling and mentally straining. After all the hard work is done and you receive your eagle globe and anchor during graduation, you have tears in your eyes. All of that hard work paid off. You finally made it, and the title Marine will stay with you forever. However I loved traveling to different duty stations and meeting new friends. The bonds you have with the people you meet will never be tarnished. The most challenging thing I ever had to face was probably my first deployment overseas. The physical and mental demands of deployments are defiantly and acquired taste. The work-ups, training, and certifications you have to pass as a unit are difficult, but once you get on ship it's a whole new lifestyle you have to learn to deal with. Living in quarters with 35 other Marines, with only a

two foot wide corridor, you are bound to hear and see some outrageous and funny things.

- 4. How are you different than from when you enlisted? I see myself much more mature. I enlisted at the age of 17, with parental consent. At the age of 18 I had graduated boot-camp, infantry training school, and My security forces training school in Chesapeake, VA. At 19, I was at my first duty station in Silverdale, WA. Again when I was 21, I was on my way to Camp Pendleton, CA for my last duty station where on my last and fifth year of my contract I would be deployed overseas. I volunteered to get deployed. The things I've seen and done, the places I've been. There was often no one to look after you when you are by yourself. I pretty much had to grow up on my own since I was 18. I'm 23 now and I loved every bit of it.
- 5. What are you doing for work/school now? I'm currently a full time student at MATC(Madison Area Technical College). I'm enrolled as a transfer student in hopes of completing some credits to then transferring to UW Stevens Point to become a DNR Patrol Officer.

6. What do you do to keep your faith strong? When I was stationed in Chesapeake, The church set up a family for me to go to for the weekends. The husband and I would always go golfing with his Navy buddies, and his wife was always the sweetest. This was my family away from home, and I still keep in very close touch with them to this day. When I was hopping around duty station to duty station, I was looking for WELS churches specifically. It was sometimes difficult to find one. My favorite WELS church was in Silverdale, WA. Christ the King church was a fantastic congregation with a diverse population of older and younger members. There were always members who offered to take me trap and pistol

shooting, golfing, to Packer parties and out to church picnics. My Mom was always happy to send the weekly church service DVDs to me while I was deployed. Whenever I was stressed out I would always watch a church service and it would seem to calm me down because it was something I am very familiar with. I was best friends with the Episcopal priest as there was no WELS pastor who was a chaplain. This was the closest I could get to my faith without my faith being skewed. I always had fun sitting with the Navy chaplain on the ship and watching the church services together. I always attended his services every Sunday while on ship. The only time I missed out was when we were off the ship and training in foreign countries. However when all the other Marine units were out and about, I always seemed to bump into him. We would always talk about our next upcoming church services and what not.

On a side note, every church I have ever gone to has known one of our pastors at Zion Church. This is because the WELS synod is very small. Every pastor I know, knows a Zion pastor who can ask questions and tell what a good guy I am.

7. What are the greatest challenges you see facing our congregation? What is your favorite thing about it?

There really is not a challenge I see, but I do see a lot of activities going on within our church community that people can get involved in. There are so many activities including the ladies tea parties, football by Pastor's house, the yearly ski trips to cascade and many more activities. I think this is a strong way to keep in touch with other brothers and sisters in Christ, but it is also a good way to stay connected by going to these fun outings and events. It's a fun way to meet not only new friends within our congregation, but other people within other neighboring WELS congregations. It promotes a strong tie with other sister churches.


